Environmental education reading books

We support The Tokyu Foundation for Environmental Purification (now The Tokyu Foundation), which was established in 1974 to protect the environment in the Tama River basin. The foundation has been conducting research and studies on environmental purification and improvement in the basin, providing subsidies, cooperating with the government, and conducting public relations activities. The Foundation also contributes to the development of future human resources by distributing environmental education reading books to elementary schools in the Tama River basin, with the aim of having local children gain knowledge and familiarity with nature and the blessings of rivers

Building biological network

On the rooftop of "Futako Tamagawa Rise complex" (Setagava-ku, Tokyo), we are working to maintain and preserve the network that connects the ecosystems of the Kokubunji cliff line and the Tama River area by recreating the surrounding vegetation in the facility. There are hundreds of killifish, loaches, mottled fish, and turtles, and we are working with local residents to maintain this environment that recreates the local waterside environment along the Tama River. We are also working to conserve the Aster kantoensis, an endangered species that lives in the Tama River basin. and we provide opportunities for learning about the local natural environment and ecosystems during the blooming season.

Minami-machida Grandberry Park Station

"Minami-machida Granberry Park" (Machida City, Tokyo) is a 22-hectare integrated redevelopment that includes a train station, commercial facilities, and an urban park that was opened in collaboration with Machida City under the concept of "the whole town becomes a 'PARK'". By planting flowers and fruitbearing trees on the exterior of the commercial facilities, birds and insects are encouraged to live in the area, and the green infrastructure and local resources of the adjacent Tsuruma Park are utilized to create a town that combines rich nature and liveliness.
